

The lobby is currently mainly political

- The strongest push comes from political actors
- **Example:** Netherlands no decision but coalition agreement Zero option not present in any procedure
- Positioning the regulator
 - Role in EIA? Mandate and expertise on environment?
 - Role in decision procedures beyond licenses?



- Attitude of regulator under pressure in all nuclear alliance countries
 - Rigorous independence!
 - safeguarding independence! (organisation, staff, budget, formal and informal relations, communication)
 - Rigorous transparency!
 - Language matters
 - Leave politics to politicians leave non-regulatory mandate to ministries
 - Demand Justification!



Technological hypes - SMRs

Don't bite too early

There are too many low-chance projects around

Regulatory capacity will always be limited

- Financing is not an issue at the end of procedures – it is part of rigour of safety and of justification
 - And it includes decomm and waste
- Transparency about supply chains crucial for safety
- Transparency about "harmonisation" it should not undermine project specific safety
- Transparency about license conditions cost driven downgrading of conditions will eventually downgrade safety
- Transparency in communication be clear about populist claims



The positive: we have a rigorous regulatory structure in place in many countries – though it can be improved in others

The warning: it needs to be resistant against ideology and pressure from politics
